Music Ministry

“We Gather Together” A Folk Song of the Netherlands arranged by Edward Kremser

Who is ready for a **real** lesson in history? This hymn has a great story! Thanksgiving would be considered incomplete without the singing of this hymn. Our singing of this hymn is an expression of gratitude to God as our guide and defender throughout the year passing. The original text by an unknown author was written toward the end of the sixteenth century as a celebration of the Dutch gaining freedom from Spanish overlords who had been driven from the Netherlands and the freedom that was theirs both politically and religiously. Although there were many nationalistic songs resulting from that event in Dutch history, “We Gather Together” stands as the finest and most long-lasting.

It was first published by Adrian Valerius in his *Neerlandtsche Gedenckclank* in 1626. It remained solely Dutch for some 250 years until it was discovered in 1877 by a Viennese choral director and publisher, Edward Kremser, who included it in his hymn collection entitled *Sechs Altniederlanddische Volkslieder*. The English translator of the text was Theodore Baker, who is a well-regarded music historian most often remembered for his *Baker’s Biographical Dictionary of Musicians* first published in 1900, which is to this day considered one of the most complete works of its kind.

History buffs give an ear! “We Gather Together” can best be understood and appreciated from its historical setting. For many years, Holland had been under the scourge of the Spanish military and in 1576 Antwerp was captured and sacked. Again, in 1585, Antwerp was captured by Spain and all of the Protestant citizens were sent into exile. Many other Dutch cities suffered the same fate. One of the respected leaders of the struggle against Spain was William the Silent who was eventually assassinated by the Spanish. In 1625, his youngest son, Frederick Henry, Prince of Orange, took on the role of leader of the Union of Dutch Provinces, and under his leadership of more than a quarter century, a great age of prosperity and rich culture developed all through Holland. As you might remember from your World History classes, Dutch commerce spread worldwide during this time. Some of the world’s most well-known artists, including Rembrandt and Vermeer, came from this period. Spain finally was completely thrown out in 1648, and control was regained by Holland.

With this history lesson under your belt, you can better understand the text of this hymn which reads in part: “the wicked oppressing now cease from distressing,” “so from the beginning the fight we were winning,” and the final stanza in which God is asked to continue to defend his people – “and pray that Thou still our defender will be.”

So as we sing this hymn on November 21st before our annual Thanksgiving holiday, recall that this hymn not only has meaning at harvest time but also speaks of freedom from the oppression of one people over another.

Advent Conspiracy - 2010

What will you do with your Christmas that will have eternal significance?

We believe that God is calling us, through the Advent Conspiracy, to partner with Keith and Kelly Rodgers and their ministry, Hope for Nicaragua, to fund a dental clinic. They will be moving to San Juan Del Sur, Nicaragua in January to begin partnering with the people of the community. The first project they will be working on is partnering with Teethsavers International by bringing dental hygiene and care to this community of 30,000. In San Juan Del Sur there is a medical clinic that has been built by the community and is not currently being used.

Keith and Kelly will bring in Dental Technicians, trained by Teethsavers, to staff the clinic. For the annual cost of \$5,000 they will be able to provide the Technician and supplies to minister to this community for a year! Teethsavers will be providing both dental and personal hygiene classes, education, toothbrushes and other dental and health needs as well. Most importantly, they will be making the gospel of Jesus Christ available to 1000’s of people who come to be served by Teethsavers.

Please join us as we set our goal of \$5,000 to be raised during the Advent Conspiracy so that we can provide this urgent need to the people of Nicaragua. *We are asking every person who attends Westminster to GIVE UP ONE GIFT THIS YEAR and apply that money to a collective project for the church.* You will have the opportunity to give to this great mission opportunity during the December 19th worship service.
