Denominational Standards Changing and Other Big News

This month's Session meeting was dominated by two issues in the life of Westminster. The first was a summary of impending changes to our denomination's constitution and the second was impending changes to our staff. Did those catch your attention? Good. You need to know what I'm about to write.

First, regarding denominational standards.

Our denomination has been in a battle over denominational standards for ordination for 30 years now. The main controversy has centered on the issue of whether a self-avowed practicing homosexual person should be allowed to assume the office of elder or deacon. Each time the issue is debated, it is set in the context of a specific amendment which we vote up or down. This year, that amendment is called "10A" in reference to its place in a longer line of other amendments. Although our Presbytery voted against this amendment, it would appear that it will pass and become the new standard sometime in May.

The passage of 10A in our denomination specifically means that the national ordination standards have changed from language that states an ordained officer of the church must "live either in fidelity within the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman, or chastity in singleness" to one must "submit joyfully to the Lordship of Jesus Christ in all aspects of life. The governing body responsible for ordination and/or installation shall examine each candidate's calling, gifts, preparation, and suitability for the responsibilities of office."

In this new ordination standard, the Presbyterian Church (USA) has shifted the authority for applying its ordination standards from the national level to the local presbytery and session level. This represents a de-centralization of the church and puts more discernment in the hands of the people at the local level.

For our local congregations nothing has really changed in the way that we examine candidates for elder or deacon in our church. The training is the same, and each congregation has its own ethical expectations for its church officers that come from the Scriptures and our Book of Confession. A congregation cannot be forced to ordain or receive pastors or elders or deacons whom they do not approve. However, the national standard that once governed all PC(USA) churches in regard to this controversial issue has been removed such that each session and each presbytery (regional body) must determine what their standards will be.

In response, our Session has taken two actions. First, we approved a Code of Ethics for our congregation that establishes a wide range of very clear ethical norms for our members, employees, and officers. In regard to our officers, this code retains the current language of our Book of Order known as the "fidelity and chastity" clause. Secondly, we have joined with several other sessions in our Presbytery asking that our local presbytery adopt this same code. These clearly defined standards for Palo Duro Presbytery will serve as a guideline for all of our ordained pastors in our presbytery and will work to make sure that ethical expectations are very clear for any candidate who comes through our ordination process, or any pastor who comes from another presbytery to be installed in Palo Duro Presbytery. While across the nation, each presbytery still determines which ministers they will and will not receive in their presbytery, our proposed local standard seeks to uphold the traditional understanding that a minister must live "in fidelity in the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman or chastity in singleness."

In addition to this response, the Session has also voted to send Matt Mitchell and me to a conference in August called "the Fellowship." The purpose of this gathering is to see where

God might be leading the evangelical wing of our denomination. Specifically, they are exploring new ways for us to associate and relate to the PC(USA) as a differentiated group within the PC(USA) that would be bound by theological and biblical commonalities as well as certain expectations as to membership in that association. For all of this, your prayers are much needed.

Second, regarding our search for an Associate Pastor of Christian Education.

Please be in prayer for our Associate Pastor Nominating Committee as they are in the final stages of discernment with one particular candidate for this position. If that sense of call is finally confirmed by the committee and that call is confirmed by the candidate, then we will begin moving toward presenting the candidate to the congregation for your vote in the near future. If that sense of call is not finally confirmed, then we will be at square one again in that process.

The focus of this position is adult Christian education. This position was last held by Paul Gibson and before him by the Rev. Dan Birchfield. The position was recommended to our Session by our strategic planning committee. This person's role will include programmatic pastoral care (like our hospital visitation team), congregational fellowship events (like July the 4th), and the development of Bridge and Build groups from Sunday to Wednesday and everything in between. This will be an all-adults position; however, there is also an emphasis on development of our young adult and men's ministries.

Along with these two issues, the Session handled its regular business with its usual aplomb. Among our prayers that evening were the families of all that had lost loved ones this month. Thank God for the good news of Easter and the truth that He still lives.

"Jesus Paid It All"

Leading our youth and college ministries in worship has honestly become one of the most fulfilling parts of my job as Director of Worship Arts here at WPC. It is during these intimate, spirit-led times of corporate worship in our chapel or basement that I truly feel my heart opening to the Lord as I listen to the inspiring sounds of students worshipping their amazing heavenly Father.

During one of these recent worship sessions, while in the basement with the SURGE youth, we experienced some technical problems with our sound system. Guitars and microphones were cutting in and out during our sound check, and as time drew closer to begin the worship set, both Shawn and I were more than a little worried about the system making it through the entire set of music (at least 30 minutes worth). Even after we examined the system components, our student media engineer, **Andrew Eliason**, and I were dumbfounded... we would simply have to hope for the best.

Four songs into worship, the system went out... as we were singing the words of the classic hymn, "Jesus Paid It All."

I knew it as soon as my guitar went mute...we were sunk. Our electric guitarist, **Autry Johnson**, was plugged into an independent amp and still going strong, although he

definitely noticed our sudden drop in volume... everything else was dead. As my mind raced, looking for the words to tell the students we would have to stop worship, I heard the voices of our students continuing the song. They not only kept singing...they sang even *louder*. And as the words "Jesus died my soul to save/My lips shall still repeat!" rang out in our basement, the Holy Spirit could truly be felt, moving in and through the hearts of our students, pulsating with the power of Christ...and it was more powerful than ANY sound system I've ever heard.

As we left the basement that night, I couldn't help but think about my tendency to worry constantly about what's going to happen if our technology fails during a worship service. What if a projector screen goes out? What if our sound system completely crashes? What if, what if, what if??? And the truth is, that would definitely be a big distraction for the congregation. BUT, as a friend of mine is constantly reminding me, "The blood of Jesus still works." Jesus, in fact, DID pay it all and that message still rings true, whether our praises are coming through an amplifier or we are simply singing with a small group of friends. We have an amazing gift in being able to worship freely and fully. How will you use your gift as we continue to celebrate our Risen Lord and Savior?

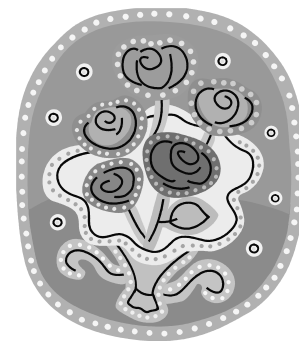
