"He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. For by Him all things were created, in heaven and on earth. Visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities – **all things were created through Him and for Him.** And He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together." Colossians 1: 15-17.

This verse is a great and challenging reminder of the centrality of Christ in our lives. What is amazing about this is that we can live as though it is not true. The challenge of our 2012 stewardship campaign is for us to evaluate our lives in light of the truth of this verse that all things are "through and for Him," and then to commit ourselves once again to living out our faith as faithful stewards of our calendars, our character, and our checkbooks.

As the Session works to be a faithful steward of our church's checkbook, they have established a proposed budget for 2012. Against that budget, the Session will be comparing our expected revenue from members' pledges. Financial stewardship campaign materials will begin arriving in early November. In Gathering Sunday for the reception of our members' pledge cards will take place on Christ the King Sunday, November 20th, 2011.

Session's work to be a faithful steward of our character (the traits and gifts God has given us for works of service that He created in advance for us to do – see Ephesians 2:10) has taken many forms this past month. Highlights include the following items:

The APNC completed its work on the Church Information Form. Candidates for the Mission and Evangelism position see this document first when considering our church.

All committees are gearing up for the holiday season with all of its special events including Trunk or Treat, the Stocking Project, Lessons and Carols, etc. Additionally, the new line up of WNL classes has been unveiled following a great night of comedy with Kenn Kington. Of special note is that Sunday, November 20th, teams of volunteers will work to "green" the sanctuary in preparation for Advent and Christmas. Please contact Carol Keeling or call the church office if you are interested in helping with that project.

In Presbytery news, our congregation's motion was passed. The motion mandates that candidates for ministry or pastors seeking membership in our presbytery be provided a Code of Ethics for review, and, that they be asked "will you seek to uphold these standards of ethical conduct?" The standards relate to a number of issues including that one maintain fidelity in the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman and chastity in singleness. Speaking for the presbytery, Rich Schempp informed our Session that "the answers can be a part of the interview process but not a part of the ordination or membership decision." A denominational relations team has been formed to shepherd the process of responding to denominational concerns. Every effort is being made to establish a plan for this that takes into account developing information and best practices. All of this is leading to the day when the

conversation can be opened up to the congregation in a constructive way.

Finally, a new addition has been made to the staff – Jeff Kuhlers. Jeff will be managing the sound system for our worship and other gatherings. As a part of this role, he will receive training on a new sound board for our sanctuary.

As you can see, the work of the church is broad in its scope but simple in its focus – all things are through and for Christ. May we here at WPC individually and corporately seek to live this truth as faithful stewards of all "the way, the truth, and the life" has provided us.

assisted high school choirs for five years and was for two years the assistant choir director at Lubbock, Cooper Junior High School. You have seen him direct on occasion at WPC.

I met Jonathan while serving at CHS where it was a thrill to work with him on **Les Miserables** in which he played the role of Jean Valjean. Who would have ever thought that he would end up the next fall singing at WPC? It has been great to have him with us for these years as he has earned his Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees. During that time we have seen him in many roles on the stages at Texas Tech and the Moonlight Musicals. Jonathan has had lead roles at Texas Tech in productions of **Candide, Orpheus in the Underworld, Rita, and Sweeney Todd**. Many of you have delighted in seeing him in the Madrigal Dinners ... you remember the jester? That's our guy! The Moonlight Musicals have offered him the opportunity to appear in **Buddy, Guys and Dolls, Hello Dolly, Willy Wonka, The King and I**, and most recently **Forever Plaid**. Last summer Jonathan departed Lubbock to appear at the historic Cedar Rapids Opera Theater in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, as a young artist recipient.

Mentioned earlier was his knowledge and enthusiasm for old hymns. His favorite hymns are

"I'll Fly Away," "The Blood Will Never Lose Its Power," and "Victory in Jesus!" One of his favorite anthems is "My Eternal King" by Jane Marshall which we have sung at our Tenebrae service on more than one occasion. Even though Jonathan has a solid background in both classical and church music, he does enjoy '50's & '60's pop music, classic rock, and dance music.

We are glad that Jonathan has made Westminster his home for these years he has attended Texas Tech. Jonathan will be leaving us this spring as his career is going to take him away for a while. WoW Breast Cancer Recognition

As everyone is aware, October is "Breast Cancer Awareness" month throughout our nation and the color "pink" shows up everywhere. Although great strides in research continue to be made and treatments continue to improve, the fact is that we still do not know the "why" and one in eight women—and men as well—continue to be diagnosed with this insidious disease.

In honor and recognition of the survivors within our congregation who have walked this path, the Women of Westminster planned commemoration in two ways:

On October 1st, we participated in our first Komen Race for the Cure as **Team WoW**. Under the leadership of our team captain, Nadine Birney, thirty-four entrants—women and men, members and friends—signed up to walk/run in this area-wide event. It was great fun to meet early and then to join others in our respective races (5K run/walk or 1-Mile walk). Beyond the fun & fellowship, we were able to raise over \$1,000 in contributions to the Susan G. Komen Foundation for Breast Cancer Research. It is our hope to make this an annual event and that others will join us in this effort.

Then, on October 16th, with the realization that cancer has touched most every member of the Westminster congregation in some way, WoW honored survivors of all types of cancer in both worship services. The first to be recognized and asked to stand were the 13 WoW breast cancer survivors who had given permission to share their names and who are listed below; next, all survivors of other types of cancer stood to join them; and finally, family & friends who have lost a loved one to cancer were asked to stand. Joining hands, a prayer of celebration was offered, with praise and thanksgiving for the survivors among us, as well as for those lives who were dear to us, noting the joy and promise of resurrection and reunion.

Whatever our circumstances, may we live in joy and not in fear, with grateful hearts in the realization that every new day is a precious gift to live for our Lord and Savior!

Adult Ministry

Have you ever stopped to ponder the effect that Constantine had on world Christianity? Constantine was the first Roman Emperor to convert to Christianity. In 313 AD he issued the edict of Milan that granted religious tolerance throughout the Roman Empire. This removed the penalties for practicing Christianity that had resulted in the martyrdom of so many Christians.

It would have taken sincere conviction to follow Christ in a time and place where you could be killed or tortured for your faith. It appears that overnight all of that fear and trembling had, for the most part, been erased. Where Roman soldiers once destroyed churches, now they were rebuilt with government funds. On top of all this, now the Roman Emperor himself raised the banner of Christ above his armies and wrote the name of Christ upon his soldiers' shields before battle. The religious society in Rome that had forever

followed the "Old Gods" now began to pay attention to this historic Jewish Rabbi. For many, Jesus was simply added to a long list of other deities who were worshiped in the culture. Why? Because it was trendy. Jesus had this great new logo, the army was victorious, and now the Roman Emperor was singing the praises of this new God.

In the midst of all this, what it meant to follow Jesus changed. It no longer required the kind of dedication and commitment that required one to face persecution and to give up one's life. Being a Christian now agreed with culture. The depth of devotion that one must have to follow Christ went from a willingness to give all, to adding Jesus to a list of gods whom your family values.

Since I have returned to the South Plains of Texas from the North Eastern part of the country, I have noticed something. The North East is hostile to Christians. A great majority of the population in that part of the country thinks that the world would be a kinder, less judgmental, more educationally advanced place without Christians. In order to be a Christian in that part of the world one must be willing to suffer persecution and ridicule. What about the South Plains? If we were really honest, does one suffer more social persecution for being a Christian or for being an atheist? I suspect that just like post Constantine Rome, Lubbock, Texas, is a very easy place to be a Christian. At its most basic level, it costs individuals very little to follow Jesus in the South Plains. Maybe that's because it is so simple to add Jesus to a long list of other gods that our family worships.

As we come into the advent season God is convicting me to ask tough questions about what my family truly worships. Christ's continued word in my ear is that following Him means picking up my cross. I know that God's grace is sufficient but that Christ calls us out of our comfort zones. If following Christ is sweet and comfortable for you or me, then I think we have lost the trail.
